Herrold Reunion

Forty-fourth annual reunion of the Herrold families, descendants of the late Simon S. Herrold and the late Frederick Herrold, was held at Rolling Green Park on Saturday, with more than 200 present, Sunbury and Port Trevorton being most largely represented.

Rev. Ben Herrold, Altoona, conducted the reunion meeting in the afternoon, in the absence of the president, Dewey Herrold, and opened devotions with a prayer. He gave a talk on reunion organizations and their social and educational value to members of a family clan.

A report from George W. Herrold, Trevorton, acting as substitute for Dr. Elwood Flanders, of York, the historian, gave a resume of the research which Dr. Flanders has conducted during the past year with regard to three stone houses in the Port Trevorton area, one dating back to 1816, that were originally the property of Herrold ancestors. Information given concerning successive residents to Herrold families through wills and grants, as learned from a perusal of deeds in the court house. A cemetery at Chapman, which contains the bodies of Revolutionary War veterans is named for the Herrold family and schoolhouses in the Chapman area also bear the family name.

A book on the family tree is being planned with the use of material gathered by historians of the reunion organization through the years.
